FROM REVD PAUL CAWTHORNE

Easter is here, the air is warming, the leaves are appearing, new life all around. It is a wonderful season of fulfilment and of promise. During Lent we have followed Jesus on his road to Jerusalem through deep, dark suffering and now to his mysterious emergence into a new kind of life. Not a life which is easy for the limited faculties of us humans to comprehend at first, yet something glorious which turns our understanding of life itself upside down.

Some faithful women who knew Jesus came, as St Luke records, very early on the first day of the week bringing spices they had prepared. There is a lovely translation of their reaction when the tomb is empty: "they were utterly at a loss", bewildered. Yet gradually, gently, pointers emerge. First two angels; then Mary of Magdala sees a character she recognises; then an encounter on the road from Jerusalem to Emmaus which convinces two disciples that Jesus' death was not the end but was part of God's plan for redeeming humanity. Then an appearance to a group of disciples including the ultra-pragmatic Thomas who ends up saying "My Lord and my God". Then when Peter is back fishing on the lakeside, a familiar voice calls "Friends, have you caught anything?" and soon they are all breaking bread together on the shore and eating their fill of fish.

What a springtime, what a relief to those who thought forlorn despair was the order of the day, what a glimmer of joy to those who heard the news and dared to hope. What a time, the gradual change from bewilderment to realisation that something earth-shattering had happened, or rather was now underway. After the Ascension, they gather again to discuss what has happened and to make plans how best to stay true to Jesus' message. Then something amazing happens, with a sound like a rushing wind. But that is to jump ahead in our story. For now let us bask in the springtime, full of unexpected promise, full of renewed hope, full of presence, of God, our crucified but risen loving Lord.

BALDONS PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Flood water on the Road

We are aware that villagers have been concerned at the continuing flow of water across the road at the top end of The Croft and the consequent road safety implications.

The matter was reported to the Highways department early in the New Year and their recent advice is that this is not a highways responsibility and is a land drainage problem which needs to be resolved by landowners. Informal discussions have been held with land owners/managers and it is expected that exploratory work to identify the problem and improve drainage will have been started before the end of March.

Planning applications

Baldons House East. P18/SO389/HH An application for minor changes to an already approved plan has been supported by the Parish Council

Mallams, Toot Baldon P18/SO328/FUL an application for variation of conditions on an already approved plan. Supported by the Parish Council

Penstemon House, Marsh Baldon P18/SO333/FUL. A retrospective application for approval of a store for horse feed. The Parish Council have raised concerns at the size and location of the building as an intrusion in the Green Belt and have recommended refusal to SODC.

World War 1 Armistice commemoration: The Battle's Over - Ringing out for Peace

The ending of WW1 is to be celebrated nationally. A campaign has been announced in which councils, communities and organisations are invited to participate.

The proposals for the national campaign include bell ringing by churches and braziers or bonfires to mark the event on the evening of Sunday 11th November.

The Parish Council believes that the Baldons should take part and will be looking at it in more detail. We will welcome participation from any person or group in the village interested in helping. Contact Stephen Dance or Dorothy Tonge if you want to help.

Road closure notice The Croft

Confusion was caused by the recent road closure notices for The Croft that was distributed to houses by a sub-contractor of BT. Following our discussion with the Highways department it was evident the contractor did not have the necessary permission to close the road and the plans have been put on hold. The Parish Council is given advance warning of road closures that have been agreed by the Highways department and we will issue information via the Baldons Info email circulation when new dates for the work are announced.

Blenheim Corner

There is a small area in the south east corner of the Green which had been badly overgrown and inaccessible. The council has had a contractor in to clear the area and it is now accessible for pedestrians.

Good causes sign up to new community lottery

More than 30 charities and voluntary groups from South Oxfordshire attended an event on 28 February to find out about an exciting new community lottery being launched by the district council.

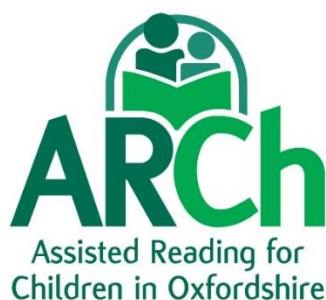
SO Charitable Lottery is being introduced this spring by South Oxfordshire District Council to help raise funds for local good causes. The event took place at Cornerstone Arts Centre in Didcot for good causes to sign up and get more information about how they stand to benefit from joining. The lottery will give residents the chance to enter a £1 weekly online draw and be in with the chance of winning prizes, ranging from free prize draw tickets to a jackpot up to £25,000.

Cllr Elizabeth Gillespie, Cabinet Member with responsibility for the new lottery, said: "Our council is committed to supporting the voluntary sector and we're launching this lottery to create a fun way of helping to raise money for the local community, within the community. It's a very exciting time getting good causes

on-board and with the countdown to tickets going on sale soon, we were absolutely delighted to see so many people at today's event.

“If there are other good causes that want to get involved, it's not too late – they simply need to apply to register on the socharitable.co.uk website.”

From each ticket bought, 60p will go to good causes and the local community. Players will be able to choose which cause they support when they purchase tickets. The rest of the money will go to the prize fund and running costs – the council will not receive any of the proceeds.

FROM COUNTY COUNCILLOR LORRAINE LINDSAY-GALE

OCC BUDGET 2018/19

OCC agreed its budget at a Full Council meeting on 13 February following a five-hour meeting of all 63 county councillors. Council Tax will rise by 5.99%, the maximum amount allowed without a referendum. Key points include:

- Finances are sound compared to other councils, with difficult decisions having already been taken
- The Council Tax rise will deliver extra money for adults and children's social care
- Proposal to extend £500,000 contribution for homelessness for an extra year in 2019/20 (subject to consultation)
- 10-year programme to improve transport network and release more money for road maintenance
- £15,000 for each of the 63 county councillors to spend on local priorities in their area

OCC STEPS UP POTHOLE WORK AS WINTER HITS THE ROADS

Repeated cycles of ice, thaws and snow have created the worst possible weather conditions for roads over the last few months leading to a rise in reports on Fix My Street from 3,000 pre-Christmas to 7,000 during January. OCC has drafted in more staff to carry out inspections and contractors Skanska are sending out more teams to carry out repairs. An additional Dragon-Patcher is now in action on the road network travelling round on an 'inspect and fix' basis on the rural network. There is also good news in the form of almost £1m in extra funding from the Department for Transport in recognition of damage done to the roads by bad weather. This money will be spent on road patching later this year as that will give longer lasting benefits and better value for money. Defects that make roads hazardous will be dealt with within 24 hours as usual. Remember, if a defect has paint markings around it then it has already been scheduled for repair and does not need a new report.

Set in the medieval heart of England's smallest city, Wells Cathedral is widely regarded as one of the finest in the country. As well as its iconic, breath-taking West Front, it has an unusual octagonal Chapter House, a Jesse Window (considered to be one of the most splendid examples of 14th century stained glass in Europe) one of only four chained libraries in the UK, the Wells Clock and the medieval Vicars' Close, believed to be the only complete medieval street left in England.

There is a cafe, with views of the West Front over the moat of the nearby Bishop's Palace.
